As we reflect on 2024–2025, I extend my sincere gratitude to everyone who has supported Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS). Your trust and encouragement enable us to continue our mission of protecting animals and conserving biodiversity.

Over the past year, our teams responded to numerous animal rescues across Telangana and Andhra Pradesh—saving wildlife trapped in wells, freeing animals entangled in waste and dangerous materials, and assisting animals that wandered into human settlements. Our wildlife rehabilitation center in Hyderabad continued to provide critical care to injured and displaced animals until they could safely return to the wild.

Through our Oceans Detangled initiative, we worked closely with fisher communities to remove ghost fishing nets from the sea and coastlines while creating livelihood opportunities through recycling and upcycling programs. These efforts help protect marine biodiversity and promote community participation in ocean conservation.

None of this work would be possible without the dedication of our rescuers, volunteers, partners, and donors. Together, we are building stronger systems for animal rescue, conservation, and coexistence.

OUR MISSION & VISION

VISION

To bring different communities to play a vital role in nature conservation and make common people sustainable ecologically and economically.

MISSION

To protect natural ecosystems through education and sustainable actions. By engaging the affected communities, the Animal Warriors Conservation Society aims for community-driven nature conservation, which can solve the problem at a large scale.

RESPONSIBLE KITE FLYING

During the kite flying season, many birds suffer severe injuries due to hazardous kite strings such as glass-coated manja and synthetic threads. These sharp strings can cut wings, necks, and legs of birds in flight, often leading to fatal injuries. They also pose risks to people, causing road accidents and injuries.

To address this issue, Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS) implements the Responsible Kite Flying initiative to promote safer celebrations. The project includes public awareness campaigns encouraging the use of safe cotton thread instead of harmful manja.

AWCS also conducts bird rescues, provides treatment and rehabilitation, and organizes manja cleanup drives to remove dangerous kite strings from trees and public spaces.

VIJAYAWADA FLOODS

Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS) is among the pioneers in responding to animal rescues during disasters across India. During the severe floods in Vijayawada, Andhra Pradesh, caused by heavy flash rains and the breach of the Budameru River bund, thousands of animals were stranded and many lost their lives.

AWCS teams immediately mobilized for rescue operations in the affected areas. Despite challenging conditions and high water levels, our rescuers worked tirelessly to reach stranded animals. Through innovative efforts, the team built makeshift boats to navigate flooded areas and access locations that were otherwise unreachable.

Through these efforts, AWCS successfully rescued more than 1,000 animals during the disaster response. This operation highlighted the importance of rapid response, innovation, and dedicated teamwork in saving animal lives during emergencies.

TACTICAL RESCUES

Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS) conducts tactical rescues for both wildlife and domestic animals, including dogs and cattle, trapped in difficult and dangerous situations such as wells, drains, pits, buildings, and water tanks. Using specialized rescue techniques, equipment, and trained personnel, AWCS ensures animals are safely retrieved from confined or hazardous locations. These operations require careful planning and coordination to protect both the animals in distress and the safety of the rescue teams.

WILDLIFE RESCUES

Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS) regularly responds to wildlife entering human habitats, including snakes, crocodiles, mongooses, and other reptiles. Our trained rescue teams safely capture and relocate these animals in coordination with the Forest Department, releasing them into suitable natural habitats. Through these rescues and community awareness efforts, AWCS helps reduce human-wildlife conflict while ensuring the safety of both people and wildlife.

BRING BACK SPARROWS

Our Bring Back Sparrows project continues to save hundreds of sparrows each year. The initiative aims to create safe nesting spaces for breeding pairs within urban areas where natural habitats are disappearing. Scientifically designed sparrow nest boxes are installed and distributed among communities to provide secure homes for these birds. This effort helps support breeding, sustain local sparrow populations, and encourage community participation in urban bird conservation.

WATER FOR ANIMALS

Providing water for animals in urban areas is one of our key commitments. Through this initiative, we encourage communities and individuals to place water bowls in their homes, balconies, and public spaces, especially during the hot summer months. By regularly maintaining these bowls with clean drinking water, people can help birds, stray animals, and small wildlife quench their thirst and survive extreme heat conditions in cities.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT & OUTREACH



Animal Warriors Conservation Society (AWCS) conducts awareness programmes that promote responsible behaviour toward wildlife and the environment. Through the Responsible Kite Flying campaign, AWCS educates the public about the dangers of nylon manja to birds, animals, and humans, while also conducting vendor awareness programmes to discourage the sale of illegal nylon manja.

AWCS also promotes co-existence with urban wildlife through community and school sessions that reduce fear and human-wildlife conflict. In coastal regions, the organisation raises awareness on ghost nets and marine conservation, engaging fishing communities on the impacts of abandoned fishing gear. These initiatives help build informed communities that actively participate in protecting wildlife and nature.

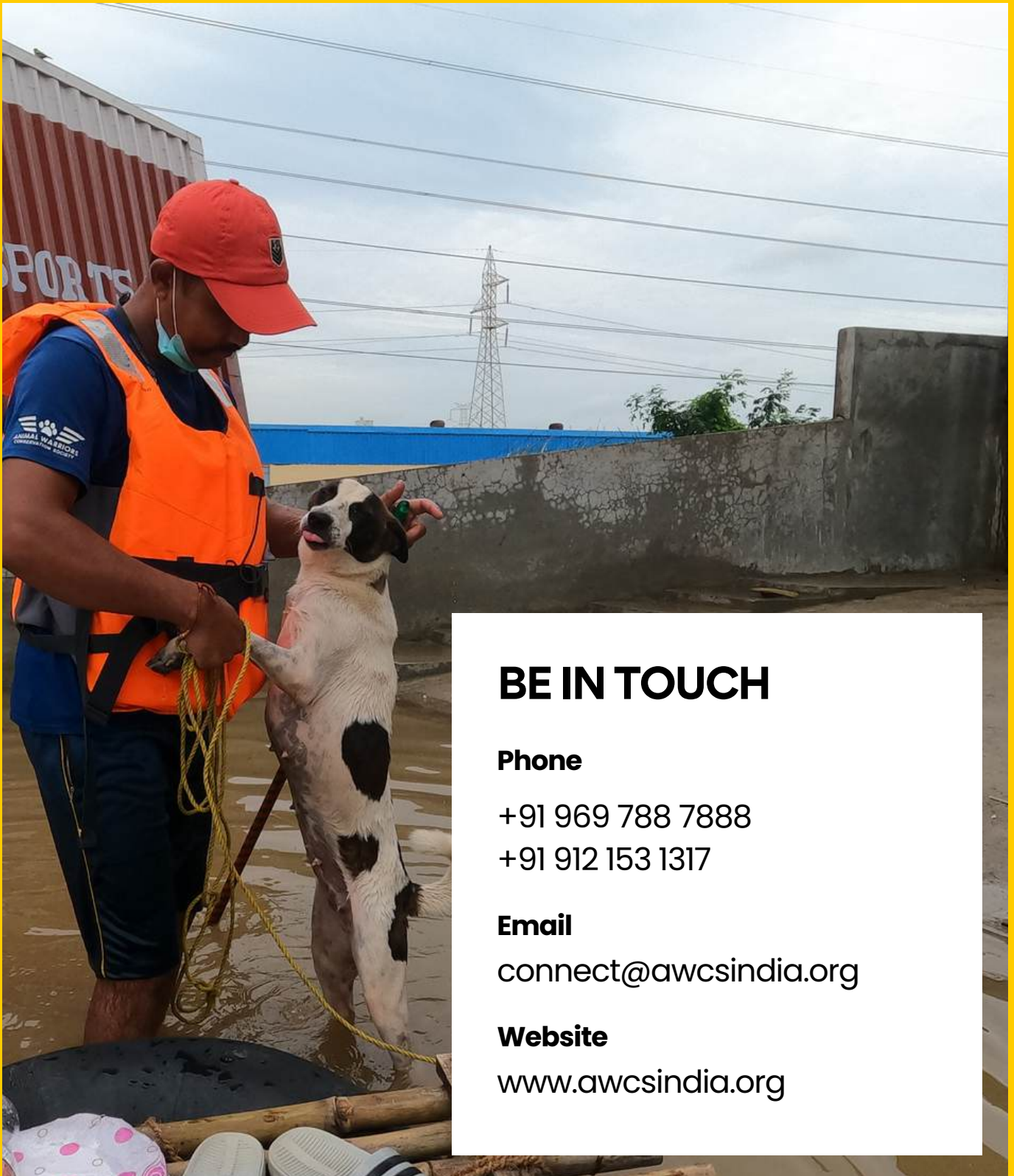
